Between 1866 and 1915, more than <u>a5</u> million immigrants poured into the United States.
Two main factors created this immigration: push factors and pull factors.
PUSH FACTORS (conditions that drive people to leave)
> Land became <u>SCarce</u>
> Political and Religious persecution
> Revolution in Mexico
PULL FACTORS (Conditions that attract them to new area)
> Promise of <u>Freedom</u>
> Hope for better <u>life</u>
> Industry provided <u>Jobs</u>
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Immigrants had to pass <u>Inspection</u> before entering the U.S. Ships were stopped at <u>Ellis</u> <u>Island</u> off of New York Harbor. Doctors watched
the men, women, and children as they came off the boats. The had to stay until
they got If they failed to regain full health, they would be sent back to
Europe.
Asians were processed on <u>Angel</u> <u>Island</u> in San Francisco Bay.
Americans did not want Asians to immigrate, so they often facedlong delays.
In the late 1800s patterns of immigration changed. Many did not speak <u>English</u>
and were of different religions. They found it harder to adapt to life in the U.S.
Immigrants settled in neighborhoods with their own group (a group of
people who share a <u>Common</u> <u>Culture</u>). Immigrants did mingle with other <u>Ethnic</u> groups. Learning <u>English</u> was an important step in
becoming a citizen. The process of becoming part of another culture is Assimilation
Assimilation was easiest for the <u>Children</u>
Anti immigrant feelings grew stronger in the late 1800s. Workers resented immigrants because
they took jobs for <u>low</u> <u>pay</u> . Nativists worked to end immigration from
China . The Chinese helped build the <u>economy</u> of the West. But as
the population grew so did <u>prejudice</u> and <u>violence</u> against them. In
the population grew so did <u>prejudice</u> and <u>violence</u> against them. In 1882 Congress passed the <u>Chinese</u> <u>Exclusion</u> <u>Act</u> . This
banned the <i>immigration</i> of Chinese laborers for <u>10</u> years.

ELLIS ISLAND
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STATUE OF LIBERTY

The Statue of Liberty was a gift from in 1865. Construction of the
Statue began in France in 1875 with the original title being " Liberty Enlightening the
World." It was sculpted by Frederic Auguste Bartholdi and construction was completed in
Paris in June of 1884. It was dismantled and shipped to the U.S. in 1885.
The Statue of Liberty was accepted on behalf of the U.S. by President Graver
<u>Cleveland</u> on October 28, 1886. It was designated a National <u>monument</u>
in 1924. The spikes in the crown represent either the seven or the seven
<u>continents</u> . The 25 windows in the crown represent the <u>natural</u>
minerals of the earth. The <u>fogure</u> represents the Ancient Republic of
Rome while the torch represents enlightenment. The
<u>Chains</u> underfoot represent Liberty crushing <u>Slavery</u> .
