## 1930s – The Great Depression and The New Deal

<u>A</u>	Collapsing Economy
•	Problems with the U.S. <u>5+arted</u> started in the late <u>1920s</u> .
•	Major industries were <u>declining</u> , but stock prices were still <u>rising</u> . This
	led to <u>risky</u> investments.
•	Margin buying let people buy <u>stocks</u> by paying a <u>small</u> portion of the total
	cost and <u>owing</u> the rest.
0	On October 23, 1929, stock prices started <u>Falling</u> rapidly.
•	Margin buyers were forced to <u>5ell</u> their stock to pay off their <u>loans</u> , and the heavy
	selling caused prices to <u>drop</u> more.
0	The stock market <u>Crashed</u> on October 29, 1929. This is known as " <u>Black</u>
	Tuesday "
•	Many investors <u>lost</u> all of their <u>money</u> .
II	ne Great Depression Begins
0	The Great Depression was a major <u>economic</u> and <u>social</u> disaster that
	affected the entire country.
•	The Great Depression lasted 12 years and was triggered by the Stock Market Crash.
•	One cause of the Depression was <u>Over production</u> . Factories produced more
	goods than people could <u>afford</u> to buy.
	A <u>banking</u> crisis was another cause. Rural banks lost money because <u>Farms</u>
	were failing. Urban banks lost huge in the stock market crash.
•	Thousands of banks <u>closed</u> , and <u>depositors</u> lost their money.
	People had <u>less</u> money, so factories cut <u>Jobs</u> and closed.
	Companies declared <u>bank ruptcy</u> (financial failure – couldn't pay their <u>bi//s</u> )
	The Depression spread worldwide. European countries failed to repay
	their loans.

The Human Cost
<ul> <li>From 1929 to 1933, the unemployment rate went from <u>3</u> to <u>45</u> percent.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>The number of people without <u>Jobs</u> was about <u>/3</u> million.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>With little or no money, many people lacked adequate <u>Food</u>, <u>5helter</u>, and</li> </ul>
clothing.
• The Great Depression was a time of widespread <u>poverty</u> and <u>misery</u> .
Hoover Responds
• At first, President Hoover's advisers recommended doing <u>nothing</u> . They believed the
Depression was temporary.
• He encouraged <u>businesses</u> , <u>local</u> governments and <u>charities</u> to
help those in need by setting up 500 p kitchens.
• In 1932 he created the <u>Reconstruction</u> <u>Finance</u> Corporation, to
provide money to local governments and key industries.
• The Depression <u>Continued</u> and <u>Hoover</u> was blamed.
• The <u>Bonus</u> incident damaged Hoover's popularity.
• WWI <u>Veterans</u> marched on Washington to demand early receipt of a <u>\$1000</u>
bonus (extra payment) promised for their <u>military</u> service.
• When some veterans refused to <u>/eave</u> , government forces <u>Fired</u> on them, which
outraged the country.
Franklin D. Roosevelt
• Roosevelt was elected President in 1932. He was disabled from polio. He is the
only president to be elected to $4$ terms. His program was called the $New Deal$ .
The 3 goals of the New Deal were:
• Relief for the <u>Jobless</u>
• Economic recovery
• Economic reform to prevent <u>Future</u> depressions
He began Fire side Chats, which were 30 national radio broadcasts
to explain his <u>measures</u> and <u>Reassure</u> the public.

Relief for the Jobless	
Federal <u>Emergency</u> Relief Administration (FERA)	
• Provided <u>Financial</u> help for the unemployed. <u>Job</u> programs offered employm	ient.
Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC)	
<ul> <li>Hired jobless men (18-25 ) to work in <u>national</u> parks, <u>Forests</u></li> </ul>	and
wilderness areas.	
Works <u>Progress</u> Administration (WPA)	
<ul> <li>Hired people to build or repair <u>schools</u>, post offices, <u>roads</u>, bridges, and</li> </ul>	
airports	
Economic Recovery	
National Recovery Administration (NRA)	
Aimed to keep prices <u>stable</u> while increasing <u>employment</u> .	
Public Works Administration (PWA)	
<ul> <li>Hired people for major public works <u>projects</u>, (Lincoln Tunnel, Grand Coulee Dam)</li> </ul>	
Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA)	
• Built dams along Tennessee River to provide jobs and electricity in a pove	erty
stricken region.	
School region.	
Reforms to Prevent another Depression	
Truth in <u>Securities</u> Act	
<ul> <li>Required companies to report <u>honestly</u> about their stock</li> </ul>	
Federal Deposit <u>Insurance</u> Corporation (FDIC)	
• Protected bank <u>depositor 5</u> by guaranteeing <u>Individual</u> deposits up to \$2	,500.
Federal <u>Power</u> Commission (FPC)	
<ul> <li>Helped control the <u>qa5</u> and <u>oil</u> industry</li> </ul>	
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Obstacles to the New Deal		
The <u>Supreme</u> <u>Court</u> struck down several of the New Deal Programs. Roosevelt		
decided to "_pack" the court by proposing to add additional judges. (Raising the		
number from 9_ to 15)		
Congress defeated the plan, but during his terms as President he did appoint nine new		
justices.		
FDR and Labor Reform		
Francis <u>Perkins</u> was appointed Secretary of Labor. She became the 1 <sup>st</sup> <u>woman</u>		
Cabinet Member. She supported reforms that gave workers more <u>rights</u> .		
The <u>Wagner</u> <u>Act</u> guaranteed the right to organize <u>Unions</u> and banned unfair		
Firing of union members. Also, it allowed <u>Collective</u> <u>Bargaining</u> , or		
the right of unions to <u>speak</u> for all workers in <u>labor</u> negotiations.		
The Fair Labor Standards Act guaranteed a minimum wage and maximum hours for the		
work week.		
Social Security Act		
Congress also passed the Social Security Act.		
This was a <u>3</u> part government program.		
1. It provided pensions for older people		
2. Provided unemployment insurance		
3. Provided <u>support</u> payments for dependent <u>children</u> and people with		
disabilities		
<u>Eleanor Roosevelt</u>		
The President's <u>wife</u> went to places the President couldn't. She toured the <u>nation</u> ,		
talked to the <u>unemployed</u> , visited <u>coal</u> mines and then reported her findings to		
the <u>President</u> . She also wrote a <u>news paper</u> column and had her own		
<u>radio</u> program.		

The Dust Bowl
The Dust Bowl was located in the Southwestern $\underline{Plain 5}$ . It was brought about by a severe
drought that began in 1930. Crops <u>Failed</u> , and with no plants to hold the
top soil , it blew away in giant dust storms called "black blizzards." This
environmental disaster lasted for <u>5</u> years and turned <u>100</u> million acres into wasteland.
Oklahoma was hit especially hard. Thousands abandoned their farms and moved to
<u>CaliFornia</u> to find work.
Scorecard on the New Deal
Arguments against the New Deal
• The <u>5/2e</u> of the federal government increased along with its <u>role</u> in solving social problems
• Powerful federal government threatened individual <u>Freedom</u> and free <u>enterprise</u> .
• Increase in the national <u>debt</u> through <u>deFicit</u> spending (government spends
more money than it <u>receives</u> in taxes)
• The New Deal programs did not fulfill their <u>goal</u> of full <u>economic</u> recovery.
Arguments in favor of the New Deal
• Employed <u>millions</u> and improved <u>working</u> conditions on the job.
• Ended the banking crisis and <u>reformed</u> the stock market.
· Built dams and bridges
<ul> <li>Preserved 12 million acres of packland</li> </ul>
• Provided <u>electricity</u> to rural areas
• Restored Americans' <u>Faith</u> in government
<ul> <li>Many believed New Deal programs saved <u>democracy</u> in the U.S., when other</li> </ul>
countries in the world turned to dictator ships during this time.
