8 Parts of Speech:

Noun: Person, place, thing, or idea

verb: Expresses an
action or state of
being

Pronoun: Renames a noun or other pronoun

Adjective:

Describes a noun or pronoun. Answers these questions: Which one? What kind? How many?

Adverb: Describes a verb, an adjective, or another adverb and answers these questions: When? 'V'here? How? How :h? Why? To What extent?

Preposition:

"Anywhere a mouse can go." Shows the relationship of a noun or pronoun to some other word in a sentence

Interjection:

Expresses emotion and has no grammatical relation to the rest of the sentence

Conjunction: Joins words or groups of words (phrases or "ses)

Diagram Flow Chart: Follow these steps when diagramming

1. Highlight any prepositional phrases

- > Look at your preposition sheet to help you
- > Think "anywhere a mouse can go"
- > Label the first word of the phrase "P" (Preposition)
- Label the noun or pronoun of the phrase "OP" (Object of the Prep)
- Any words in-between will be adjectives, adverbs, or conjunctions

> THE PREPOSITIONAL PHRASE WILL NEVER BE ON THE BASELINE – it functions as an adjective or adverb.

2. Find the subject

- The subject is who or what the sentence is about.
- > It is a noun or pronoun.

3. Find the verb


- You have two choices for verbs action or linking.
 - o AV = If it is an action verb Ask yourself, "Can you do it?"
 - LV = You can find all the linking verbs on the purple sheets.
- Your subject will always be paired with the verb or verb phrase.
