Adverb Notes

 Adverbs are words that modify or describe Adjectives, Verbs, or other Adverbs (A.V.A.)

Adverbs answer four questions:

- Where?
- When?
- In what way?
- To what extent?









Examples of Adverbs:

- Adverbs of frequency: always, sometimes, never
- Adverbs of time and place: here, yesterday, then
- Adverbs of relative time: recently, soon, already
- Adverbs of degree: extremely, very, rather
- Adverbs of quantity: few, a lot, much
- Adverbs of attitude: fortunately, apparently, clearly

Placement of Adverbs:

- Adverbs are usually found after the verb.
- If there is a Direct Object, it will come after the Direct Object. It will never come between the verb and Direct Object.

Comparative and Superlative Adverbs

- If an adverb does not end in ly, you can usually add er for comparative or est for superlative forms
- If an adverb ends in ly, you MUST use more to form comparative and most for superlative forms

Irregular Comparative and Superlative Adverbs:

<u>Positive</u>	<u>Comparative</u>	<u>Superlative</u>
badly	worse	worst
far	farther/further	farthest/furthest
little	less	least
well	better	best
