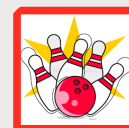
8th Grade Graduation Dance Scheduled For May 5:

Late submissions will not be accepted. All applications will be reviewed by the faculty council in March and students will be notified of acceptance before spring break. National Junior Honor Society Application Information:

Attention all students interested in joining NJHS. In late January, students with a cumulative grade point average of 3.9 or higher will be added to the NJHS Application Google Classroom. Once in the classroom, students will have access to the NJHS digital application as well as specific information that will outline what achievements are needed to be considered for induction into Liberty Junior High's chapter of NJHS.

Some of the basic requirements are as follows:

1. Maintain a minimum cumulative G.P.A of a 4.0 at the end of the second trimester.
2. Participate in at least three clubs or activities, one of which must be a Liberty club or activity.
3. Obtain at least five hours of service to either school or community.
4. Maintain a positive discipline record.
 - If an office referral OR four classroom steps are on your record, you will not be eligible for NJHS.
5. Demonstrate strong character in the classroom.
 - If you receive four or more late and/or missing assignments, you will not be eligible for NJHS.

Included in the google classroom is a document to log all service hours and club/activity/sports participation. In the digital application, you will need to answer questions about your G.P.A. and your discipline record. Applications and all accompanying documentation will be due March 10, 2023 and induction into NJHS will occur in April. If you have any questions, please email Mrs. Clark at jlark@nlsd122.org.

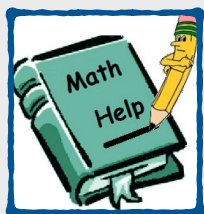

NURSE'S NOTES



Does your child text you when they are sick at school?

Students who are not feeling well at school should **not** be calling or texting their parents/guardians during the school day. It is against our school's rules for students to use their phones during the school day without permission. In addition, it creates confusion with visitors arriving at the school unexpectedly. If your child does not feel well, they should visit the school nurse. If it is determined that a parent/guardian should be called, the nurse will do so.



The school nurse is a great resource for our school community. She is trained and experienced in triage and can often take measures to successfully address an issue and allow for the child to stay in school for the remainder of the day, thus avoiding unnecessary absences. The nurse is also an excellent resource for other health-related situations or issues that may arise in school. For example, students that have painful menstrual cramps. Menstruation is a normal process of life that may cause symptoms such as aches in the back or abdomen, headaches, fatigue, bloating, mood swings or food cravings. The school nurse can provide non-pharmacological comfort measures such as heat packs, short breaks in the office, and emotional support. If menstruation happens unexpectedly, the school nurse can provide needed supplies such as pads and tampons as needed. If your student has frequent complaints of painful cramps that cause difficulty concentrating in school, over-the-counter pain medication may be helpful. A parent can bring in medication as needed or it can be kept in the health office if a medication authorization form is turned in by a parent and signed by a doctor. The medication authorization form can be found on the following two pages of this newsletter. As a reminder, students should not bring their own medication with them to school.

I authorize the School District and its employees and agents, to allow my child or ward to carry and self-administer his or her asthma inhaler and/or use his or her epinephrine auto-injector: (1) while in school, (2) while at a school-sponsored activity, (3) while under the supervision of school personnel, or (4) before or after normal school activities, such as while in before-school or after-school care on school-operated property. Illinois law requires the School District to inform parent(s)/guardian(s) that it, and its employees and agents, incur no liability, except for willful and wanton conduct, as a result of any injury arising from a student's self-administration of medication or epinephrine auto-injector (105 ILCS 5/22-30).

Please initial below to indicate (a) receipt of this information, and (b) authorization for your child to carry and use his or her asthma medication or epinephrine auto-injector.

For all Parents/Guardians:

By signing below, I agree that I am primarily responsible for administering medication to my child. However, in the event that I am unable to do so or in the event of a medical emergency, I hereby authorize the School District and its employees and agents, in my behalf, to administer or to attempt to administer to my child (or to allow my child to *self-administer* pursuant to State law, while under the supervision of the employees and agents of the School District), lawfully prescribed medication in the manner described above. This includes administration of undesignated epinephrine auto-injectors or opioid antagonist to my child when there is a good faith belief that my child is having an anaphylactic reaction or opioid overdose, whether such reactions are known to me or not (105 ILCS 5/22-30, amended by P.A. 99-480). **I acknowledge that it may be necessary for the administration of medications to my child to be performed by an individual other than a school nurse and specifically consent to such practices,** and I agree to indemnify and hold harmless the School District and its employees and agents against any claims, except a claim based on willful and wanton conduct, arising out of the administration or the child's self-administration of medication.

I authorize the school nurse to talk to the prescribing physician by phone about the medication.

FOOD ALLERGY AWARENESS



Foods that most often cause an allergic reaction:

PEANUTS
TREE NUTS
WHEAT
SOY

MILK
EGGS
FISH
SHELLFISH

However, other, less common foods can also cause allergic reactions. Reactions can range from mild to deadly.



Anaphylaxis is a serious allergic reaction that is rapid in onset and may cause death. The most common causes of anaphylaxis are food, medication, insect stings, and latex.

Common warning signs and symptoms of an anaphylactic reaction:



- Complaint of a tingling, itchiness, or metallic taste in the mouth
- Hives
- Difficulty breathing
- Swelling and/or itching of the mouth and throat area
- Diarrhea
- Vomiting
- Cramps and stomach pain
- Paleness (due to a drop in blood pressure)
- Loss of consciousness

If you see someone showing any of these symptoms, **ACT FAST! Call 911**, mention anaphylaxis, and say you need someone who can administer epinephrine.
