






Lesson 3: Adverb Clauses

The subordinating conjunctions *because, although, if, and unless*, among others, introduce adverb clauses. Like adjective clauses, adverb clauses are always diagrammed below main clauses. When diagramming an adverb clause, place the subordinating conjunction on a diagonal line drawn from the verb of the main clause to the verb of the adverb clause. Here are several examples: *I cannot admit you to the theater unless you have a ticket. If you look in the wastebasket, you will find your bottle of water. Although Richard had no raincoat, he walked three blocks in heavy rain. They punished their child because they thought that a punishment would help him.*
